Learn how the NYS SMP leveraged its program resources and community relationships to create the SMP Empowerment Council.

Elders in four distinct communities in New York City are learning to detect, prevent, and report Medicare fraud, errors, and abuse while identifying innovative ways to empower their communities to combat fraud and health care access barriers in their communities.

Population/Demographic Tools

Environmental Justice (EJ) Zones are defined as any census block group where 23.59% or more individuals live in poverty, and/or 51.1% or more of the population is minority. (About NYC's EJ Zones)



EJ Zones – Environmental Exposures

- In NYC, EJ Zones may be in neighborhoods with industrial facilities, waste treatment plants, major transportation infrastructure, or other sources of pollution.
- These communities often face challenges such as poor air quality, contaminated soil, lack of access to green spaces, limited availability of fresh and healthy food options, and inadequate infrastructure for waste management and sanitation.



EJ Zones – Health Risks

People who live within an EJ Zone community face much worse health outcomes because of environmental exposures.

- More likely to report having poor health and have higher prevalence of chronic diseases such as hypertension and diabetes.
- Less likely to have one or more doctor's visits but have higher rates of hospital and emergency room admissions.



EJ Zones – Lack of Resources & Targets for Fraud

People who live within an EJ Zone community:

- Are overlooked for resources
- Tend to be distrustful of resources coming to them from outside their area
- More likely to be targeted by scammers

In 2019, researchers at Johns Hopkins University concluded that providers who were excluded from Medicare for committing fraud and abuse were most likely to be treating patients who were from a minority population, low income, or disabled.



EJ Zones – Isolation

Other studies have shown that community members in EJ Zones:

- Are less likely to engage in social activities further compounding the negative health affects of situations beyond their control.
- Lack social connections creating additional obstacles for older adults such as
 isolation and depression and puts them in direct opposition to the many benefits
 that are gleaned from having direct involvement in one's community.

Psychological studies on subjective well-being, life satisfaction, and having a large network of social support continue to highlight the connection between health and an older adult's community involvement.



Our initiative is structured in a way that will facilitate social connections.

It will not only bring in diverse perspectives, but it will also improve wellbeing,

life satisfaction, and increase social networks of community members who

participate in the **Empowerment Council** and related SMP activities.

JCC OF STATEN ISLAND

JCC is the largest senior adult provider on Staten Island overseeing the DFTA funded Senior Adult Network which provides services to approximately 600 senior adults a day. In addition, JCC operates the only NORC program in the borough of Staten Island, located in Community District One.

Funding provided through the NYC Council enables them to offer NORC services that include:
Evaluation and Intake, Information and Assistance, Healthcare Management, Healthcare
Assistance/Monitoring, Transportation, Outreach Activities and Public Information.

NEIGHBORHOOD SHOPP

Neighborhood SHOPP is a non-profit social service agency founded in 1980 located in the heart of the South Bronx serving Black and Latino older adults, caregivers and those with disabilities seeking long term care support, information and assistance.

SHOPP's mission is to promote the independence and the mutual assistance of older adults, caregivers and the disabled by offering vital support services, educational training and engaging activities which empower participants to remain active, restore productivity, promote civic engagement and enhance the quality of life of individuals while remaining safe in their communities.

NEWTOWN SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER, INC.

Newtown Senior Citizens Center, Inc. has served the community in which it exists since its inception in 1971. Located in the Elmhurst section of Queens (CD#4), which is the largest Asian community outside of Chinatown in NYC, Newtown has successfully sought to address the diverse needs of elders living in the community through services and activities which enhance their quality of life.

Newtown has continually grown over the years and now serves over 150 seniors daily.

RAICES

Founded and incorporated in 1978 by Latino older adults, the Spanish Speaking Elderly Council – **RAICES** is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization that operates in New York City. RAICES' mission is to respond to the unmet needs of the Latino, African American, and low-income communities by improving their quality of life through advocacy and the direct provision of targeted services.

RAICES serves over 3,000 participants per year and currently operates eleven direct service sites, seven in Brooklyn and four in Queens.

2. Develop Community Specific Needs Assessments

- Each subcontractor has identified groups & initiatives that they would like to organize and implement according to the needs they experience in their communities.
- From their suggestions, we designed materials and organized activities that have proven to be successful.
 - ✓ We reach many community residents in a variety of languages. The SMP volunteers are active leaders and eager to bring information that benefit their peers.
 - ✓ We design materials in a variety of languages to help the NYS SMP become a trusted source of information, empowerment and advocacy for communities that do not necessarily access services in a traditional manner.

3. Devise & Implement Plans of Action Tailored to Specific Communities

- As of today, 100% of the sites have been trained.
 Adding 32 new volunteers to the NYS SMP Corps of Volunteers.
- We have trained in 2 languages (English & Spanish).
 The sites want to continue recruiting volunteers, so the number of volunteers as well as the languages in which they will be trained may increase.
- PR SMP provided us with the training kit translated into Spanish, and we also translated documents in Spanish and Cantonese to be disseminated into the community.



3. Devise & Implement Plans of Action Tailored to Specific Communities

- Volunteers are busy contacting their local groups to schedule presentations.
- Volunteers are making presentations and tabling at events disseminating SMP materials.
- All sites have successfully integrated into the NYS SMP
 Volunteer Corps by participating in our monthly Volunteer
 meetings where they receive updates and bond with SMP
 volunteers from around NYS.



• Each site participated in the recent Medicare Fraud Prevention Week through scheduled events and participating in our social media campaigns.

3. Devise & Implement Plans of Action Tailored to Specific Communities

- Queens: Hosted the US HHS Regional Director, Dr. Dara Kass for a Town Hall on Health Care & Senior Issues conducted in English / Mandarin / Spanish.
- Staten Island: Sponsored the closing ceremonies of the Senior Olympics.
- **Brooklyn:** Participated in Senior Center Health Fairs and deployed volunteers to community events where there is high Spanish speaking participation.
- **Bronx:** Scheduled presentations and disseminated literature in English & Spanish to senior centers & Older Adult residences.























Impact of the Program

Newtown Senior Center, Queens - "An increase in members' self-advocacy/reliance: Able to review their MSNs/[EOBs], inquire about the medical need of prescriptions/tests, and ask their providers for further explanation when unsatisfied with an instruction/response." (Maria C.)

RAICES, Brooklyn - "Members expressed feeling 'empowered by the peer-education services' and receptive to SMP initiatives." (Lisete S.)

RAICES, Brooklyn - "They're retaining what they've learned and sharing it with their family, friends, and faith groups." (Meris P.)



Neighborhood Shopp, Bronx -"They can identify fraudulent calls/mailing/emails. Their Medicare acumen has increased so they know more services they qualify for." (Willie D.)

Jewish Community Center, Staten Island - "They recognize SMP as a trusted source of information." (Paloma W.)



Moving Forward

- 6-month program extension March through August 2024
- Hired a new Spanish speaking counselor Harold Rivera
- Continue Volunteer Recruitment and Training
- Develop new partnerships with community organizations
- Plan future initiatives:
 - Senior Safety Summit in each location.
 - Empowerment Council Conference Meet with CMS & ACL Regional Administrators
- Reproduce translated materials as we replicate this program in our new SMP grant cycle focusing on communities around the state including Central NY, Western NY, the Hudson Valley and Long Island.







Oklahoma Population Density





- Trained but refers seniors to our program for counseling. Invite us to participate in activities
- Use our counselors. Invite us to participate in activities
- Allow us to participate in some activities

- Tribal staff meet with MAP to understand services. Contact us with questions
- Some contact achieved through multitribal events
- Relationships can change very quickly, so stay connected.
- Developing a structured plan to identify resources and needs within each tribe.
