Edith Vioni Sullivan, Ph.D.



Dr. Sullivan is Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Stanford University School of Medicine in Stanford, California. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Connecticut. Following graduate school, Dr. Sullivan was a research scientist in the Department of Brain and Cognitive Sciences at MIT for a decade, focused on component processes of amnesic syndromes and then research scientist in the Ashton Graybiel Spatial Orientation Laboratory at Brandeis University. On moving to Stanford, she complemented her neuropsychological studies with quantitative brain imaging to establish selective brain structure-function relations in alcoholism. Dr. Sullivan's funded program of research focuses on faulty frontocerebellar circuitry as underlying a selective subset of cognitive and motor dysfunctions

commonly expressed in alcoholism. In addition, she is an investigator a number of other national and international research projects using neuropsychological and neuroimaging approaches to advance our knowledge of age-alcoholism interactions across the lifespan from adolescence to senescence and disease-alcoholism interactions focused on neurological sequelae of chronic alcoholism. She is a fellow of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology and the American Psychological Association and member of professional societies, including the Society for Neuroscience, Research Society on Alcoholism, and the International Neuropsychological Society. Dr. Sullivan is an author of more than 300 peer-reviewed papers, numerous book chapters, and co-editor of the *Handbook of Clinical Neurology: Alcohol and the Nervous System*.
