Alison Evans Cuellar, Ph.D., is a Professor in Health Administration and Policy at George Mason University and a Research Associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research. Her work, in part supported by the National Institutes of Health, the John D. and Catherine C. MacArthur Foundation, and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, has examined the intersection of behavioral health and juvenile justice systems; Medicaid policies and their impact on behavioral health disorders; and policy evaluation for justice-involved populations. She is currently evaluating two programs related to peer recovery services and one related to crosssector data integration for opioid overdose prevention in Northern Virginia. Other studies have included improving cardiac care in small Virginia primary care practices and the impact of the Virginia Dual-Eligible Financial Alignment Demonstration on consumers. She has collaborated on multiple projects with large insurers and a multi-disciplinary research team to study innovative consumer and provider interventions including health care price transparency,, patient-centered medical homes, and employee wellness programs. She also was an investigator on a pediatric health needs assessment in Washington, D.C. with a special focus on vulnerable and minority populations. Dr. Cuellar currently serves as Vice Chair of the Center for Disease Control's Community Preventive Services Task Force. Previously, she served on the National Academy of Medicine's Study Committee on Community Based Solutions to Promote Health Equity in the United States and participated in the national, MacArthur Foundation-supported Research Network on Mental Health Policy led by Howard Goldman, MD.

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
